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ABOUT FOUNDATION HOUSE

The Victorian Foundation for Survivors of Torture Inc. (also known as Foundation House) provides services to advance the health, wellbeing and human rights of people of refugee backgrounds in Victoria who have experienced torture or other traumatic events in their country of origin or while fleeing those countries.

The organisation was established in Melbourne in 1987 and is non-denominational, politically neutral and non-aligned. It is constituted as a not-for-profit organisation managed by an elected Board of Management. Our work is funded by the Victorian and Commonwealth Governments, charitable organisations and donations from private individuals.

OUR MISSION:

To advance the health, wellbeing and human rights of people from refugee backgrounds who have experienced torture and other traumatic events.

The main areas of our work are:

- Providing services to clients in the form of counselling, advocacy, family support, group work, psycho-education, information and complementary therapies;
- Working with client communities to improve their capacity to access the services they need and to enable them to support recovery;
- Offering professional and organisational development, consultancy and resources to assist health, education, employment and other community service providers, to enhance the responsiveness of their services to the needs of people of refugee backgrounds;
- Working with the Victorian and Commonwealth Governments to ensure that policies and programs have proper regard to the needs of people of refugee backgrounds; and
- Conducting and contributing to research regarding the needs of people of refugee backgrounds and the best possible ways of meeting those needs.

PROFESSIONAL AND ORGANISATIONAL DEVELOPMENT

The Foundation House Professional and Organisational Development (POD) program provides a range of opportunities for people to develop their skills and knowledge in working with survivors of torture and trauma.

Public Calendar

Our public calendar of workshops includes specialist programs for individuals working in educational, early years or health settings, as well as sessions open to anyone working with people from refugee backgrounds.

Individuals can register for one and two day workshops, evening seminars, or webinars covering a variety of topics. The Calendar includes workshops suitable for a range of participant experience, including those new to the sector, those with some experience, and those practitioners seeking to extend their skills.

Partnerships

The POD program also works in partnership with other organisations to build capacity in working with people from refugee backgrounds. This includes services such as partnership development for design and delivery, eg. reflective practice or other professional development as identified together.

Professional Development for your Organisation

POD offers tailored professional development to agencies, based on an organisational development approach. We work closely with organisations to identify the learning needs of staff, and to establish the best structure for professional development. Our approach is flexible, determined by what suits the organisation, so the program may include for example, one-off workshops, a follow-up practice seminar, seminars or ongoing collaboration.

REFUGEE AND ASYLUM SEEKER EXPERIENCES

One Day Workshop

This one day workshop provides a comprehensive introduction to working with people from refugee backgrounds. Participants will gain knowledge of the context and experiences of people from these backgrounds, and explore ways of working together. The workshop will also explore positive working relationships and maintaining worker resilience in a challenging environment.

Content includes:

- An overview of some experiences of people who have fled wars and oppressive regimes;
- An outline of Australia's humanitarian program within a global context;
- The Foundation House Framework for Recovery and how this applies in the workplace;
- The psychosocial effects of traumatic experiences on individuals, families and communities - includes the impact of detention and prolonged uncertainty in seeking asylum;
- A reflection on working cross-culturally; and
- Reflections on the impact of working with trauma, professional boundaries, and locating ourselves in the work.

FOUNDATIONS IN COUNSELLING PEOPLE FROM REFUGEE BACKGROUNDS

Two Day Workshop

This two day workshop provides counsellors with a comprehensive grounding in relevant frameworks and approaches for working with people who have experienced massive trauma as a result of their forced displacement experiences. The workshop will provide structured and reflective learning opportunities and aims to provide participants with increased confidence in providing counselling and support for people from refugee backgrounds.

Content includes:

- Theoretical and conceptual underpinnings of trauma;
- The distinctive psychological sequelae of torture and other traumatic effects;
- Conducting comprehensive psychosocial assessments of survivors of torture and trauma;
- Cross-cultural considerations;
- Ways of working with trauma symptoms and challenging presentations, including the role of advocacy;
- Challenges of trauma-based work in the context of ongoing uncertainty and injustice; and
- Counsellor responses to clients including vicarious traumatisation, and sustainable practice.

WORKING WITH THE IMPACTS OF PROLONGED UNCERTAINTY: TO DO, OR TO BE?

One Day Workshop

This workshop explores the psychosocial realities of living with long-term uncertainty for people from refugee and asylum seeking backgrounds. The mental health consequences arising from pre-arrival experiences are compounded by the uncertainties of the determination process and the political environment, as well as other factors such as concern for family overseas. In the current context, client-worker interactions are frequently related to discussions around migration status, and themes relating to uncertainty can dominate the relationship. Feelings of helplessness are common in both the client and worker. Ways of supporting clients living with ongoing uncertainty will be explored and the potential impact of this work on professionals is acknowledged.

Content includes:

- Overview of historical and current Australian protection processes;
- Increased understanding of our own ways of being and levels of comfort with uncertainty;
- Exploration of the impacts of trauma, ongoing uncertainty and detention;
- Ways of working and sitting with clients living with ongoing uncertainty; and
- Identification of key principles for sustainable and professional engagement with clients.

Two Day Workshop

This two day workshop provides an approach to working with people from refugee backgrounds in a range of settings for people who are not formally trained as counsellors. Participants will gain incidental counselling and other skills for responding to difficult situations. The workshop involves presentations, practical exercises, role plays and discussions in large and small groups.

Content includes:

- Further examination of the impact of past and current trauma;
- Exploring how workers and young people interpret and 'make meaning' of experience;
- Incidental counselling skills for a range of potential situations;
- The emotional responses of workers and implications for practice;
- Building good working relationships with trauma clients; and
- Cross-cultural considerations.

SUSTAINING PRACTICE AND OURSELVES IN CONTEXTS OF INJUSTICE

One Day Workshop

This one-day workshop provides those working in contexts of injustice with a space to reflect on the impact of their work, and ways of sustaining themselves. The workshop will review and critique concepts related to stress and burnout, and explore contextual factors impacting on worker well-being. The day will be both reflective and practically oriented.

Content includes:

- A review and critical reflection on concepts related to stress, including burnout, vicarious traumatisation and resilience;
- Exploration of stressors that challenge worker capacity, including political and organisational stressors;
- Reflection on motivation and values core to our practice; and
- Sharing of practical strategies and creative approaches for sustaining practice in contexts of injustice.

COMMUNITIES AND TRAUMA: SUPPORTING RECOVERY FROM COLLECTIVE TRAUMA

One Day Workshop

Refugee and asylum seeking experiences tear at the social fabric tying people together. This workshop will explore some of the potential far-reaching impacts of collective trauma for communities in the resettlement context, and potential recovery processes.

Participants will be introduced to the Foundation House Framework for Recovery. A panel of speakers, including members from diaspora communities and a peace-practitioner will explore the legacy of collective trauma. Drawing on the model, participants will be provided with the opportunity to reflect on potential ways of facilitating connection in the context of their roles.

Content includes:

- Exploration of concepts such as trans-generational trauma and collective trauma;
- Foundation House Framework for Recovery;
- Reflections on the collective impact of trauma from members of diaspora communities; and
- Consideration of ways to facilitate connection and longer-term recovery processes in communities who have experienced collective trauma.

OVERCOMING STIGMA: ENGAGING WITH COMMUNITIES ABOUT MENTAL HEALTH

One Day Workshop

There is a strong need to reduce stigma about mental health, for people from both refugee and non-refugee backgrounds. This workshop explores barriers preventing people from refugee backgrounds from accessing support for mental health struggles, and examines ways of engaging with communities around issues affecting wellbeing.

Participants will be introduced to the Foundation House Community Capacity Building Model, and examples of work within communities will be shared. Drawing on the model, participants will be provided to reflect on potential ways of engaging with people from refugee backgrounds who have experienced collective trauma.

Content includes:

- Foundation House Community Capacity Building Model;
- Exploration of the potential effect of culture on perceptions of mental health and mental illness;
- Common mental health concerns for people from refugee backgrounds;
- Identification of key barriers preventing people from refugee backgrounds accessing mental health services;
- Examples of engaging communities around the impact of trauma; and
- Where to next? eg. identification of engagement strategies and potential ways of implementing these; future training and collaborations).

INTRODUCTION TO SUICIDE RISK ASSESSMENT

One Day Workshop

This one day workshop, in partnership with Orygen, National Centre of Excellence in Youth Mental Health, is an introduction to the basic components of suicide risk assessment and how these apply to people from a refugee or asylum seeking background.

The workshop explores the risk and protective factors for suicide in people from refugee backgrounds, with the aim of increasing participants' insight into the challenges faced by this population and how these challenges interact with risk of suicide.

Participants will be introduced to a tailored suicide risk assessment framework.

The workshop will allow for a diversity of participant roles and there will be opportunity to reflect on how suicide risk assessment skills are relevant for different roles and work contexts.

Content includes:

- Background: global rates of suicide and local policy context;
- Risk and protective factors for suicide;
- Introduction to a risk assessment framework;
- Engaging with people who express suicidality;
- Early identification of risk;
- Assessing level of risk; and
- Responding to suicide risk.

- Incidental counselling skills for a range of potential situations;
- The emotional responses of workers and implications for practice;
- Building good working relationships with young people with trauma histories; and
- Cross-cultural considerations.

WORKING WITH FAMILIES FROM REFUGEE BACKGROUNDS

Evening Seminar

Families from refugee backgrounds arrive in Australia with diverse histories of hardship and survival and need to navigate the complexity of settlement and services. This seminar will explore how services and professionals can get to know the histories and needs of families from refugee backgrounds. It will consider the range of themes that exist when clients and services encounter each other and how the voices of children and families can be heard.

It can be challenging to think about how to work with the whole family and engage family members of different ages in conversations that acknowledge past experiences whilst re-building connections within families. A detailed example will be provided of a creative intervention that can be used with all members of the family system. This includes ways to facilitate conversations that help to restore connections and begin to overcome grief and loss. The Foundation House Recovery Framework will be applied to working with families.

Content includes:

- A brief overview of Australia's humanitarian program and context to working with children and families;
- Overview and discussion of application of the Foundation House Framework for Recovery;
- Reflections on how workers can get to know children and families from refugee backgrounds; and
- A creative intervention that can be used with all members of the family.

PARTNERSHIPS WITH FAMILIES FROM A REFUGEE BACKGROUND IN THE EARLY YEARS

One Day Workshop

This comprehensive one day workshop provides an introduction to working with children and families from refugee backgrounds. Participants will gain knowledge of refugee and asylum seeking experiences, and ways of supporting parents within an early years setting. We will explore the refugee and settlement experience for children and families and examine in depth what constitutes collaborative partnerships and engagement with families, highlighting current good practices, strategies and examples from Victorian early childhood agencies.

- Refugee and asylum seeking experiences for children and families;
- The early year's role in supporting recovery and how this builds and supports the development of partnerships with families;

One Day Workshop

This comprehensive introduction is recommended as the first professional development from Foundation House for those working with students and families from refugee backgrounds. It is appropriate for those working in and with schools and other educational settings, at primary, secondary and post-compulsory levels.

Content includes:

- Refugee experiences for young people including possible prior education experiences;
- The impact of trauma on young people's learning and wellbeing;
- The role of teachers and schools in supporting recovery from trauma;
- Strategies that support the recovery process that teachers and other staff can use; and
- A whole school approach and key areas where schools can increase support for refugee background students and families.

SCHOOLS AND FAMILIES WORKING TOGETHER

Half Day Workshop

Research indicates that student outcomes are enhanced and schools are more effective when families are engaged in their child's education. Schools are becoming increasingly aware of the need to strengthen support for families from refugee backgrounds, as they navigate their way through the unwritten rules of Australian school life. This workshop will explore what family engagement means, and showcase current good practice, strategies and examples from schools successfully engaging families from refugee backgrounds.

The workshop will engage those working in and with schools and consider opportunities for schools to enhance social inclusion for newly arrived families within the school environment.

Content includes:

- Exploration of family engagement and its impact on student outcomes;
- A school's role in supporting recovery through engagement of families of refugee background;
- Strategies schools are employing to enhance family engagement within a whole school approach; and
- An exploration of a social inclusion framework.
